St. Elizabeth is a woman of prayer, dedicated to the mass and the sacraments.

Centered in Christ, Elizabeth's prayer life is the vehicle through which God's graces flow in and through her to others. She is devoted to prayer and meditation, the mass and the sacraments. As a young bride, she awakens in the middle of the night and prays at the foot of her bed. Her profession is what we today would call a Secular Franciscan, and serves as a unifying thread (or, in this case, cord). Because she is one with Jesus in prayer, she is able to live out the Holy Spirit's gifts of faithfulness, compassion, humility and charity.

First Mass Day, I.B.E.W. Hall, July 8, 1962


Beginning in July 1962, Sunday Mass was celebrated in the Hall of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (Pinelawn Road, just east of Route 110, now demolished) and also the Walt Whitman theater, once located in the Walt Whitman Mall on Rt.110. Daily mass was celebrated in the rectory on 215 Pidgeon Hill Road, in Melville. The new church was opened in 1965.

The Adult Choir began soon after the parish opened. Three years later, the Choir sang at the Vatican Pavilion in the World's Fair (1965) and produced a record album. Parishioners accompanied the choir on the organ, including Sandy Andreucci, Teddie Hoffmann, and Margaret Mary Novak. In years past, the adult choir has been invited to participate in several concerts, which include those for Habitat for Humanity, ecumenical concerts, the multi-choir Passion Concerts at St. Elizabeth as well as singing as part of the National Pastoral Musicians Choir Festival. Some parishioners have been in the Diocesan Choir and even sang at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

During the 1970's there was a *guitar mass* scheduled. The **folk group** produced a record album, "Day By Day" with their favorites. Singers included Mike and Bob Lorello, Lee Alongi, Candi Scarcella and Greg Schizzano.

In 1978 a new initiative began to involve younger families at Sunday Mass called the **Family Mass Committee**. Initially, the family mass was celebrated downstairs at 10:15. Eventually Ralph and Pauline DiCicco chaired the committee and later Chris Reilly (who was a teenage guitarist early on) assumed leadership. The families who attended sponsored events such as a ski trip, wedding anniversary mass and children's activities. When the renovated church opened in 1991, all masses were then celebrated in the main church.



In 2002 the Family Mass Committee was restarted under the leadership of Doreen Boehme. Under its recommendation a **Children's Choir** was formed in 2005 with Margaret Mesecher and Mary Schaefer as the first leaders. The Family Mass Committee was also chaired by Eileen Conneely and Marguerite Melone.

The Liturgy Committee traces its beginnings back to the late 1980's when "mass teams" were tried as a means to enhance liturgy. Early leaders included Deacon John Failla, Jeanne Victor and Mary Calabrese. Later Maureen Kubasky and Paula and Mike Conner joined the growing committee. In the 1990's Gail Mahabersing, Elizabeth Bedell and Jeanne Victor chaired the committee.

During this time Peggy White developed the current scheduling system for Eucharistic Ministers, Readers and Altar Servers. Now, in our Jubilee Year, there are 35 readers and over 100 Eucharistic ministers!

The ministries exercised by lay people at mass expanded in 1973 when lay people were permitted to read at Mass and distribute Holy Communion. The first **lectors** began early in 1973 and many of them became **Eucharistic ministers** later the same year.

Their assistance was welcomed at the nine weekend masses of the 1970's and 1980's (at one point there were as many as thirteen weekend masses!). The Precious Blood was distributed at masses beginning in the 1980's.

In the 1970's a group of women sewed bandages for the missions and veterans hospitals and began creating the baptismal garments (bibs) for baptisms. In 1990 they organized under the name **Sewing Ministry** led by Bea Lullay. Their work includes costumes for Living Stations of the Cross, curtains and banners, and mending of altar cloths. Leaders have included Peggy White and Judy Franco.



Throughout our fifty years women have cleaned, starched and ironed the altar linens. First the Rosary Society took care of this and later, the **Altar Linen Ministry** began under the leadership of Pat Catterson Magnan and later, Florence Rooney and Carmella Barecca.

Over our fifty years, a variety of prayer groups and ministries have gathered parishioners for different types of prayers and devotions. In the later 1980's after a retreat for men, Jack Falcone and Mike Conner founded the **Men's Fellowship**. For almost twenty-five years parish men have met to pray over the Sunday readings and share faith.

In August of 1991 **Eucharistic Adoration** began in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel inside the church. Bishop Alfred Markiewicz celebrated an opening mass.

Since the early 1990's the Spiritual Life Center has been the place for a variety of novenas, overseen by Eugenia Coté and Alan Thompson, including Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Sacred Heart, and Divine Mercy.



The **Renew** program, scripture-based small group sharing, began in 1992 as part of the diocesan-wide small group sharing program. During the diocesan celebration of Jubilee 2000, **Small Christian Communities** in many parishes, including our own, experienced an increase in membership. Currently there are five groups active in the Spiritual Life Center and homes.
