Anointing of the Sick

We encourage all those eligible for this Sacrament to be anointed after the Noon Mass on the first Sunday of the month or by calling the Center. Those eligible are those who are about to undergo an operation; are suffering from serious illness and the condition has worsened; or are enduring the weakening effects of advancing age and it has been one year since they were last anointed.

Trinity Sunday commemorates and honors not an event, but a reality: the Holy Trinity. Trinity Sunday always falls on the Sunday after Pentecost.

Trinity Sunday, officially called “The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity,” is one of the few celebrations of the Christian year that commemorates a reality and doctrine rather than a person or event. On Trinity Sunday, Christians remember and honor the eternal God: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Eastern Churches have no tradition of Trinity Sunday, arguing that they celebrate the Trinity every Sunday. Westerners also commemorate the Trinity at every Eucharist.

The Trinity is described as a “mystery.” By mystery, the Church does not mean a riddle but rather the Trinity is a reality above our human comprehension that we may begin to grasp but ultimately must know through worship, symbol and faith. It has been said that mystery is not a wall to run up against but an ocean in which to swim.

The Trinity is best described in the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, commonly called the Nicene Creed. Essentially, the Trinity is the belief that God is one in essence (Greek *ousia*), but distinct in person (Greek *hypostasis*). The Greek word for person means “that which stands on its own,” or “individual reality,” and does not mean the persons of the Trinity are three human beings. Therefore, Christians believe that the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are somehow distinct from one another (not divided though) yet completely united in will and essence.

How can this be? Well, think of the sight of two eyes. The eyes are distinct, yet one and undivided in their sight. Another illustration to explain the Trinity is the musical chord. Think of a C-chord. The C, E, and G notes are all distinct notes, but joined together as one chord the sound is richer and more dynamic than had the notes been played individually. The chords are all equally important in producing the rich sound and the sound is lacking and thin if one of the notes is left out.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Catholic Life Explained:

What Is the Purpose of the Pope?

Question:

Why do Catholics have a pope?

Answer:

To answer the question of why Catholics have a pope, we have to pull the lens back and think about the very nature of the Church herself. According to the Nicene Creed (which is the statement of beliefs that we recite each Sunday at Mass), we profess that the Church is “one, holy, catholic, and apostolic.” These adjectives are called the marks of the Church, and they help us see that the Church is bigger than just our individual parish communities or even the Christians living in a particular region or country.

To help ensure that the community of disciples would remain united in a communion of love, Jesus entrusted the Apostles with special authority to teach, heal, and forgive sins in his name. And from among this group, Jesus chose Simon Peter to play a special role, designating him as the “rock” on which the Church was to be built (see Matthew 16:18-19; John 21:15-17). Peter “the Rock” became the visible sign of union within and among the Apostles. In time, as Peter and the other Apostles passed away, other men were chosen to take their place. The successors of St. Peter — who we honor as the first Bishop of Rome — and the successors of the other Apostles (the bishops) continued the work entrusted by Jesus to that first generation of Church leaders.

According to long-standing tradition, the successor of Peter was Linus, who was followed by Cletus, who was followed by Clement I, etc. This line of succession continues to Pope Francis in our own time.

Over the centuries, these Bishops of Rome — who came to be known as the “pope” (from papa, which means “father” in Latin) — still continue to act as the “rock” of the Church and as the visible sign of unity for all the Catholic Christians. The pope, more than any other bishop, stands as the Church’s primary teacher and as pastor of the Church throughout the world, helping to ensure that the Church remains what Jesus intended her to be: one, holy, catholic, and apostolic. 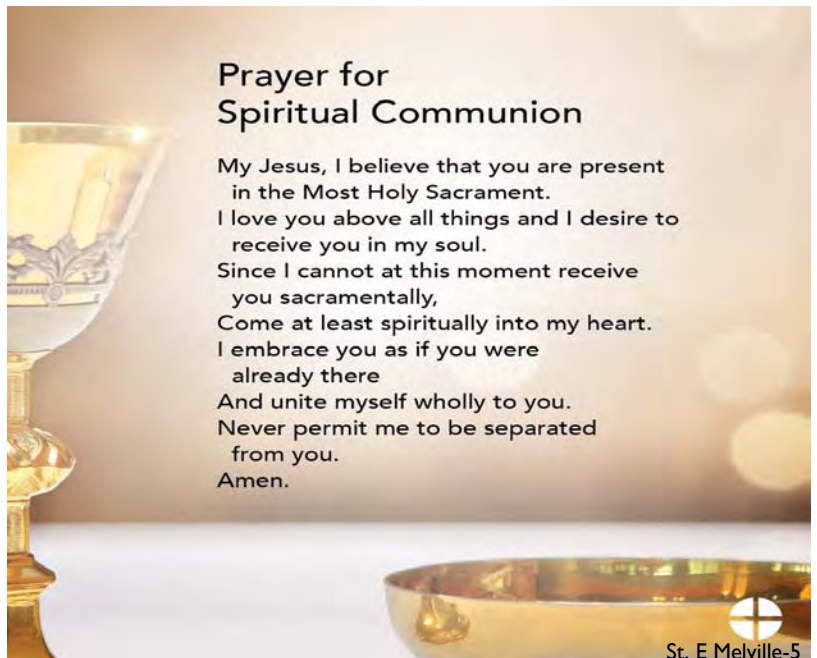
For the prayers we hold deep in our hearts, let us pray to the Lord.

Scripture Insights

Sunday, June 7
Most Holy Trinity

Today, on Trinity Sunday, we celebrate the divine qualities that have been revealed about our Triune God: mercy, fidelity, love, grace and fellowship.

The First Reading from the Book of Exodus presents two important aspects of our Triune God: mercy and fidelity. Today's reading is best understood in the context of Exodus 32, Israel's sin of infidelity in making the "golden calf" to replace God. In anger, Moses breaks the stone tablets upon which the Ten Commandments were written. When Israel atones for this sin, Moses receives a new set of stone tablets of the Ten Commandments from God. In response, Moses bows down in worship to God, who forgives His people for their idolatry. Being given a second chance at receiving the Ten Commandments, Moses recognizes God's mercy and fidelity to a sinful and "stiff-necked people."

For nearly twelve-hundred years, from Moses to Christ, Israel had God's Law, written in stone, by which the people of Israel could measure themselves in relation to God and to each other. In today's Gospel reading, we learn that God fulfills His covenantal promise to Israel, no longer in stone, but now in the flesh and blood of His Son. It is not only God's mercy and fidelity to Israel that brings forth the Word made flesh; it is God's love: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son."

In the Second Reading from 2 Corinthians, we hear one of the clearest expressions of the Trinity in the New Testament: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all." Written within twenty years after the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus, Paul already saw the principal functions of the Trinity as grace, love and fellowship.

Every Sunday

Holiday. Make every summer Sunday a family holiday. Prohibit chores. Turn off personal devices. Dress up and stream Mass

together if you can't get to church. Make an act of spiritual communion.

Spread joy and hope by creating driveway or sidewalk art with a hopeful Biblical message or create your own sacred art.



Why Do Catholics Do That ?

Why do Catholics need their priests?

At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the Eucharist, offering himself under the veils of bread and wine (*Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), #1374*), to the Father and then giving himself to us.

To ensure the sacrifice of

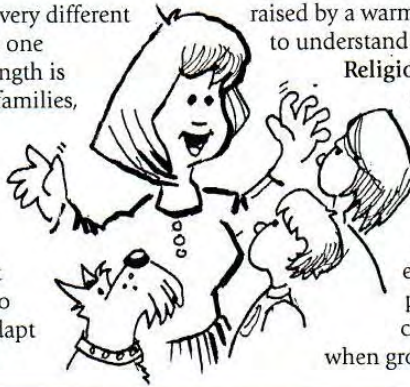


the Mass would be offered until his return, Jesus ordained his Apostles as the first bishops. As well as saying Mass and ministering sacraments, the priest is to be a spiritual father to the souls in his care, teaching, consoling, and praying for them.

Parents and faith matter more than ever

When the world around us looks so very different from what we have come to know, the one constant on which we can rely for strength is our faith. In close and loving faithful families, parents pass on their faith to their children so that it's available when needed. Building trust and showing love are important first steps.

Close parent-child bonds make the difference. Researchers found that when a child feels emotionally close to a parent, he or she is more likely to adapt the parent's religious practices. When



raised by a warm and affirming parent, it is easier for a child to understand and relate to a warm and loving God.

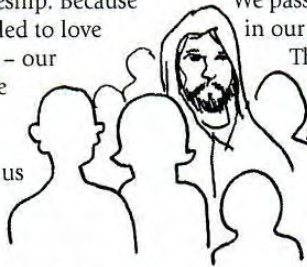
Religious parents model what they preach.

Children are motivated to follow in their parents' religious footsteps when the parents practice what they preach. That kind of authenticity is compelling. Surrounding children with a loving faith community, teaching faith practices, encouraging service, and being a consistent presence were noted as convincing to children who adopted their parents' faith when grown.

Scripture LESSON

Matthew 10:37-42, "Whoever receives you receives me"

In this passage, Jesus outlines the challenges of discipleship. Because he is God, we are called to love him above all things – our families included. He calls us to take up our crosses and to follow him. He calls us to spend our lives, not seeking our own comfort and security, but in loving service to others, firstly to God. We do all of these by God's grace, not our own strength.



Jesus identifies closely with his disciples. At Baptism, God came to dwell in our souls. Our mission is to

make Christ's love for others visible. We pass by Jesus every day, present in our neighbors, however hidden. This is why every kindness done to our neighbors, God counts as done to him personally. He will reward us even if it's just a cup of cold water.

What can a parent do?

Encourage your child to do something unselfish for someone else today. Tell her that even if no one else notices, God will, and he will reward her here, if not in Heaven. And that's what truly matters.

Parent TALK

As my children get older, my old discipline tools don't work as well as in the past. When they break rules or make bad choices, "go to your room" isn't enough.



So I bought a few Catholic reference books, a children's Catechism, Butler's Lives of the Saints and some drawing and writing materials. When the girls need "redirecting," I now assign short reports, projects, or essays depending upon the misdeed.

When Tessa "forgot" to put the money I gave her into the poor box, I assigned a three-paragraph report on St. Nicholas who gave away his money to the poor. When Kara missed turning in a couple of assignments, I had her illustrate a comic book about St. Catherine of Alexandria, who is said to have converted 50 pagan philosophers using her wisdom and knowledge.

Partnering with the saints to raise my children works so much better than giving time-outs.

Feasts & Celebrations

June 7 – The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity. Today, we celebrate the Trinity – one of the great mysteries of our Faith. The Trinity is one God in three Divine Persons: the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus Christ revealed this mystery before his Ascension into Heaven (Matthew 28:19).

June 19 – St. Juliana Falconieri (1341). Born in answer to a prayer by her devout parents, Juliana grew up to become the foundress and mother superior of the Servite Nuns. She was known for her charity, holiness, and wise counsel.

June 20 – The Immaculate Heart of Mary. In response to the request made by Our Lady of Fatima, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to Mary's gentle and devout Immaculate Heart in 1942, and initiated this feast in 1944.

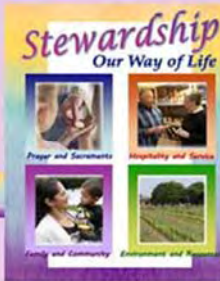
June 30 – First Martyrs of Rome (64). Men, women, and children who were martyred under the Emperor Nero, who blamed the Christians for the disastrous fire of 62. A piazza in Rome is named in their honor.
