### **REGISTRATION FOR FAITH FORMATION CLASSES**

Classes for kindergarten to eighth grade Faith Formation will begin in October 2020. We are offering classes in the Parish Center twice a month with a significantly reduced number of students in each room, following recommendations of the CDC and New York State requirements. Classes for special needs and older students who want to receive the sacraments are offered too. Our parish's program partners with parents in passing on the Catholic faith and preparing their children for First Reconciliation (Confession), First Communion, and Confirmation.

Parent meetings will be offered in the church and through online virtual meeting platforms, giving parents choices to better accommodate complicated family schedules with the unknowns of Covid-19. The Family Program's parent classes requirement will be on hold this academic year (2020-2021) as we determine how and if it can continue with the challenges of Covid-19. ### FOCUS ON THE GOOD

When I was a child, my mother had a set of sculptures resembling three human heads. One head had hands over the ears, one had hands over the eyes, and one had hands over the mouth. Of course, they depicted the phrase, "Hear no evil; see no evil; speak no evil." I have seen these images repeated many times since then, usually as the monkey heads from a Japanese proverb, which would have probably seemed a little less creepy to me when I was a small child. Apparently, there is no consensus about the full meaning or certain origin of these three images nor the phrase. At the very least, it causes us to reflect on the need to avoid evil and look for the good in things. As I have lived my life, I have come to believe there are more people who lives their lives in a contrary manner to these images. It is not that they seek evil, but it is as if they "see no good, hear no good, and speak no good." Gossiping is the way they pass the time, and they always seem to find the negative in people and situations. Being a good steward certainly means that we do not seek evil, but more than that, it means that we see the abundance of good things all around us. These gifts of God are big and little, profound and ordinary. By seeing the world in this way, we begin to change our personalities and our overall disposition. We always need to follow a new proverb: see all the good, hear all the good, and speak about the good. Amen.



What's Happening

- <u>9:30 a.m. daily Mass</u> is celebrated in church.
- <u>5 p.m. Saturday</u> Mass is celebrated in church.
- <u>9 a.m. Sunday Mass</u> is celebrated <u>outdoors</u>, weather permitting. Should we need to move indoors due to inclement weather, the same guidelines as other indoor Masses will be in place.
- 11:30 a.m. Sunday Mass is celebrated in church.

We will follow Diocesan directives, keeping every other pew unoccupied and following social-distancing and mask requirements for everyone's safety. If the doors to the church are locked, we have reached capacity for that particular Mass (of course, capacity will not be problem at 9:00 a.m. should we be outdoors.) For the well-being of our entire parish community, the church will be thoroughly cleaned after the 5 p.m. Mass and again after the 9:00 (if indoor) and 11:30 a.m. Masses.

Dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass remains in effect. If you are sick or vulnerable, we encourage you to remain home and stream Mass. Celebration of the sacraments of Baptism and Matrimony, as well as Funerals are also now permitted, keeping in mind that the guidelines for these sacramental celebrations remain the same as for Mass.

We will do our utmost best to keep you informed and up-to-date through our website and via Constant Contact emails.

Given the status of the current pandemic, despite our best efforts to mitigate exposure to the virus in the church and church facilities, attending Mass and other Church functions may pose a risk of contracting the coronavirus. The church does not have the ability to supervise every visitor's actions throughout the day and cannot guarantee with certainty that an individual will not contract the coronavirus. Please make your decision to attend Mass, or any other church function prayerfully and thoughtfully, being cognizant of all the risks. Proper face masks are to be worn at all times on church property (bandannas and scarves are not acceptable). Social distancing must be observed at all times (at least six feet apart). For your own well-being and that of other parishioners and guests, if you do not feel well, please stay home. If you feel someone on church property is not adhering to our policies, please report it to us immediately.

For all of us here, may the Lord bless us and increase within us a desire to grow closer to Him in all things, let us pray to the Lord.



Scripture Snsights

### Sunday, July 12 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The parable in today's Gospel reading is called the parable of the sower. In this parable, the sower represents Jesus, who spreads the message of the Kingdom of God like seeds. The Kingdom itself is planted like a seed in the world and in the hearts of those who are willing to accept it (Matthew 13:31-32). The different kinds of soil represent different responses to Jesus' preaching about the Kingdom. Jesus is encouraging His audience to be the rich soil; to take His words to heart and let them take root in their lives.

Today, there are obstacles to accepting Jesus' teaching, just as there were when Jesus told this parable. There is no outright rejection of a message that seems too demanding (the unyielding path in the parable). There is brief enthusiasm, followed by a kind of spiritual short attention span. They are always looking for the next new thing (the shallow soil) and there are temptations and trouble that bring doubt and straying (the thorns). In spite of our repeated wanderings, Jesus continually invites us back, calling us to open our ears to hear God's Word. When we respond, we become the rich soil that produces fruit--the product of a life of faith.

St. Paul elaborated on what a life of faith produces, the fruit of the Spirit, in Galatians 5:22-23. When the seeds of the Kingdom are planted in a person's heart, the Holy Spirit causes this "fruit" to grow: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Theses are the character traits of a person who accepts the Word of God, which lead that person to participate in works of mercy, peace and justice, not to mention the work of spreading more seeds.


